A RESOLUTION ACCEPTING A FEMA GRANT FOR \$63,890.90 UNDER THE FY 2018 ASSISTANCE TO FIREFIGHTERS GRANT PROGRAM TO PURCHASE A TURNOUT WASHER/EXTRACTOR, AMBIENT AIR TURNOUT DRYERS, A CPR MANIKIN WITH CPR FEEDBACK, AND A LIFE SUPPORT TRAINING MANIKIN; APPROPRIATING THE CITY'S LOCAL SHARE FROM ACT 833 FUNDS; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, the North Little Rock Fire Department ("NLRFD") needs to purchase Fire and Emergency Manufacturers Services Association ("FEMSA") compliant washers and dryers to clean their personal protective equipment, an advanced life support training manikin, and a portable QCPR manikin (see NLRFD grant application narrative attached hereto as Exhibit "A"); and

WHEREAS, the application of the NLRFD to the Federal Emergency Management Agency ("FEMA") and the Department of Homeland Security ("DHS") under the FY 2018 Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program was approved for the purchase of the requested equipment (see letter from FEMA attached hereto as Exhibit "B"); and

WHEREAS, the award pursuant to FEMA Grant No. EMW-2018-FO-01526 is \$63,890.90 for the Federal share, with the local match being \$6,389.10 (see Summary Award Memo attached hereto as Exhibit "C"), for a total approved budget of \$70,280.00; and

WHEREAS, there is a sufficient amount available in Act 833 Funds to cover the local share.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NORTH LITTLE ROCK, ARKANSAS:

SECTION 1: That FEMA and DHS Grant No. EMW-2018-FO-01526, in the amount of Sixty-Three Thousand Eight Hundred Ninety & 90/100 Dollars (\$63,890.90), to purchase FEMSA compliant washers and dryers, an advanced life support training manikin, and a portable QCPR manikin, is hereby accepted.

SECTION 2: That the sum of Six Thousand Three Hundred Eighty-Nine & 10/100 Dollars (\$6,389.10), representing the City's local share, is hereby appropriated from Act 833 Funds.

SECTION 3: That this Resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.



NLRFD is seeking funds to acquire 1-NFPA 1851/FEMSA compliant, 45 pound capacity washer/extractor, and 3-NFPA 1851/FEMSA compliant, 6 unit forced ambient air bunker gear dryers. This new equipment will keep us in compliance with NFPA 1851.7- 2014 Standard on Selection, Care, and Maintenance of Protective Ensembles for Structural Fire Fighting and Proximity Fire Fighting (Section 7 - Cleaning and Decontamination) Being able to respond to calls for assistance and having the proper equipment to meet the challenges of those calls is imperative for any fire department. As part of our Department's ongoing strategic planning, our safety committee, city Safety Director, and NLRFD administrative staff continue to update and modify our health and safety plans and capabilities. Our operational planning encompasses both near term and long term preparedness strategies. Of particular importance to our management team is the safeguarding of our citizens and firefighters within our jurisdiction.



NLRFD has 163 in-line firefighters who are required by NLRFD General Order to clean their PPE after every contaminant contact, or minimally, twice a year. We currently have 2 extractors, but no method of drying, other than hanging on a make-shift line, or using the hose dryers at one of the stations. These methods can take several hours to dry the gear completely, and may also promote the growth of mold and mildew between layers. NLRFD has not had the operational budget money to purchase a 2nd set of PPE for each firefighter, so this leaves our firefighters at risk by using older or borrowed equipment while theirs is being cleaned. The forced air drying systems have shown to be a quicker, more effective way to dry decontaminated PPE, which leads to a faster turn-around time in getting our firefighters PPE back to them. The ideal situation would be to have decontamination capabilities at each station, but it just is not economically feasible at this time. The addition of the items in this project will greatly reduce the workload on our current equipment, but also make it more convenient for the firefighters to clean their gear, which would make it more likely that they will do it.

Our current training manikins have begun to reach the end of their usable life. The vast majority of our total department call volume, (68%) is comprised of basic life support (BLS) and advanced life support (ALS). It is critical that our training equipment for EMS be mission ready. As a satellite training center, NLRFD instructors teach CPR, ACLS, PALS, and PHTLS to not only our own responders, but to city employees, area responders, and citizens. NLRFD does not charge any of these groups for their training, only the cost of the card itself, because we believe in our mission to affect and save lives. Some of our city employee classes consist of: senior citizen center employees, parks and recreation employees, part-time summer employees (community pools and parks), AED and CPR for all city offices, and community health events. NLRFD also hosts in-house Emergency Medical Technician continuing education, and full certification classes for NLRFD and our mutual and automatic aid partners in Central Arkansas. In addition to these free CE's. NLRFD hosts a full Paramedic certification course that is free to our

members, and open to our neighboring departments at a greatly reduced tuition, in which we strive to only break even.

We determined our cost to purchase 3 forced ambient air gear dryers @ \$10,500.00 each, the NFPA 1851/FEMSA compliant washer/extractor @ \$12,000.00, the ALS training manikin and accessories @ \$25,000.00, and the portable QCPR manikin 4-packs @ \$890.00 each.

Total Project - \$70,280.00. We are prepared to fulfill the required match of 10% of \$7,028.00.00 and are requesting a total fund request of \$63,252.00


